



DISMANTLING RACISM TOGETHER: Dismantling Racism Together (DRT) will meet on Monday, July 17th at 7:00 p.m. to hear from Morgantown High School Local School Improvement Council (LSIC) parents, Angela Carver and Duana Crum. They will share what their role and activities are with the LSIC. DRT continues to explore how LSICs review and respond to data on student disciplinary actions and suspensions. Recent state aggregate

data shows that Blacks/African American students are referred and suspended at higher rates than other racial groups. We want to understand what role, if any, the LSIC plays in addressing this disparity. Please join us to learn more.

From WV Department of Education, SY22 Discipline Data in Review

The DRT is also working with the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) for a program on **Tuesday**, **August 29th** from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at OLLI at the Mountaineer Mall on Greenbag Road. The program will start by viewing the video "Who We Are: A Chronicle of Racism in America." The video is described as "Interweaving lecture, personal anecdotes, interviews, and shocking revelations in the documentary, WHO WE ARE: A Chronicle of Racism in America, criminal defense/civil rights lawyer Jeffery Robinson draws a stark timeline of anti-black racism in the United States from slavery to the modern myth of post-racial America."

The two-hour documentary presentation will be followed by a lunch break, then an opportunity to interact with a panel of distinguished guests, featuring Bob Bastress (WVU Professor of Law), Rachel Fetty (Vice Chair of Morgantown Civilian Police Review and Advisory Board); Dr. Joseph Jones (WVU Visiting Assistant Professor in Reed College of Media); and Meshea Poore (WVU Vice President for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion). Mavis Grant and George Lilley will be facilitating this program as co-facilitators of Dismantling Racism Together.

The program requires advance registration and a fee of \$12 at the time of registration. OLLI members can register now at OLLIatwvu.org. Registration is limited and will open to the public on August 1.



Summer is upon us, and July brings forth a captivating mosaic of celebrations. While the United States commemorates its independence, this month also offers a rich tapestry of religious and cultural events. Take time this July to learn about some other important celebrations across the world.

Disability Pride Month

Disability Pride Month is celebrated every July to commemorate the passing of the Americans with Disabilities Act. This month aims to change the way people think about disability and end the stigma that people with disabilities are limited in what they can do. Nearly 15% of the population has at least one disability in the United States.

July 1: Canada Day

"O Canada!" This day commemorates the anniversary of the Constitution Act, which united the provinces and territories of Canada into one nation in 1867. Until 1982, it was known as Dominion Day. Similar to the 4th of July, citizens enjoy picnics and barbecues, festivals, and fireworks.

July 2: Thurgood Marshall's Birthday

The First African American justice of the Supreme Court, Thurgood Marshall, was a civil rights attorney who led the NAACP Legal Defense and Education Fund. He played a crucial role in the ending of racial segregation in 1954 with the Brown v. Board of Education decision, which rejected the "separate but equal" doctrine. President Lyndon B. Johnson appointed him to the court in 1967.

July 6: Dalai Lama's Birthday

His Holiness was first acknowledged as the reincarnation of his predecessor, the 14th Dalai Lama, at the age of 2. The term "Dalai Lama" is given to the spiritual leader of the Gelug school of Tibetan Buddhism. He dedicates his life to serving his people. This year, he celebrates his 88th birthday.

July 14: International Non-Binary People's Day

This day aims to raise awareness for issues faced by non-binary individuals worldwide. Many countries don't legally recognize non-binary genders, making it difficult to obtain proper identification and passports. This LGBTQ+ awareness day is celebrated during Non-Binary Awareness Week. Celebrate this day by raising awareness and fostering inclusiveness with our online **LGBT Training in the Workplace.**

July 18: Nelson Mandela's Birthday

The Father of South Africa was born on this day in 1918. He played a pivotal role in establishing democracy after serving 27 years in prison for opposing apartheid, a system of racial segregation. Mandela died in 2013 at the age of 95.

July 19: Hijri New Year

This day marks the start of the Islamic New Year, observed by most Muslims on the first day of Muharram, the first sacred month of the lunar calendar. The first 10 days of the month are significant Islamic holy days, especially for Shia Muslims, who spend the time mourning the death of Husayn Ibn Ali al-Hussein, the grandson of the Prophet Muhammad.

July 25: Pioneer Day

The Utah state holiday celebrates the arrival of Brigham Young and Mormon pioneers to the Salt Lake Valley. Not only is it a state holiday, but also a special occasion for the Church of the Latter-day Saints. While the day has strong links to the church, it is celebrated by all residents as it showcases the arrival of the transcontinental railroad.

July 26: National Disability Independence Day

The Americans with Disabilities Act was passed on this date in 1990 to create the first equality declaration for Americans living with a disability. It prohibits discrimination by both state and local governments and sets important accessibility standards for public places. It also helps protect these individuals from discrimination in the workplace.
