Here are the events for May:

Older Americans Month – Celebrates progress in protection of older in the United States and recognizes the importance of end-of-life independence and care for older adults.

Asian Pacific American Heritage Month – Recognizes the contributions and celebrates the culture of Asians and Pacific Islanders in the United States.

May 1: International Worker's Day – Also known as May Day, it celebrates the social and economic achievements of workers worldwide. The day commemorates the Haymarket Riot of 1886 in Chicago, in which police and protesters clashed following a worker's strike for an eight hour day.

May 3: World Press Freedom Day – Serves as an occasion to inform the public of violations of the right to freedom of expression and as a reminder that many journalists brave death or jail to bring people their daily news.

May 15: International Day of Families – Celebration of two or more persons providing a continuity of support for each other usually in terms of affection, nurture, security and protection.

May 21: World Day for Cultural Diversity for Dialogue and Development – Recognizes cultural diversity as a source of innovation, exchange, and creativity, as well as the obligation to create a more peaceful and equitable society based on mutual respect.

"West Virginia University Libraries will unveil a portrait of Regina Charon, a pioneering civil rights attorney and role model for women entering the legal profession, from 4-6 p.m. Friday, May 3, in the Downtown Library's Robinson Reading Room. . . .

"During the unveiling ceremony, several people who were impacted by Charon will share their memories of her.

"Charon (1946-2004) specialized in unemployment law, sex discrimination law and LGBT adoption law. Charon dedicated her legal career to serving her clients with passion, particularly focusing on cases involving discrimination and social justice. . . .

"Her commitment to justice extended to her role in establishing the Department of Women's Studies at WVU, helping establish the free clinic Morgantown Health Right, and serving as an advocate for individual civil rights and the administration of justice.

"Charon served as a board member for the WVU Council for Women's Concerns, a board member for Legal Aid of West Virginia and president of the Monongalia County Bar Association. . .

"Charon passed away in 2004 after a battle with myelogenous leukemia, but her legacy still lives on through the Regina Charon Fellowship for Law and Public Interest within the WVU College of Law. Also,

the Regina Charon Zealous Advocate Award was established in her honor for attorneys that advocate for civil rights and justice throughout administration.

"Charon's portrait will join Blakemore and Monroe's in the Robinson Reading Room on a semipermanent basis and then be added to the WVRHC's collection. The WVRHC holds a collection of papers that document Charon's life and career.

IT IS TIME TO VOTE!

CCSJ is a 501 (c) (3) organization, so we do not promote or endorse candidates. We do promote voting!

Monongalia County Clerk Carye Blaney is publicizing the need for everyone to be informed voters when they go to the polling place. You may use your phone while waiting to check in, but, once you check in, you cannot use your phone. You may take the sample ballot from the county website (cited below) or the sample ballot printed on May 5th and 12th in the *Dominion Post*. This is a long ballot because of the requirement to post the language of the levies and bond issue. The machines where you mark your ballots will time out after five minutes of no activity, and you will have to start over, so please read about those items in advance to make your decisions.

The League of Women Voters of Morgantown and Monongalia County has posted two videos from its forum for the Monongalia County Board of Education candidates on April 24th. Here are the important dates for the primary election:

May 1 – May 11- Early Voting 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. daily (except Sunday). There are three early voting sites in Monongalia County: Mountaineer Mall, 5000 Greenbag Road, Morgantown, WV 26505, (Front side of Mall next to Mylan); Mason Dixon Park, 79 Buckeye Road, Core, WV 26541 (In the red barn); Suncrest Towne Centre, 525 Suncrest Towne Centre Dr., Ste. 101, Morgantown, WV 26505

May 8 - Last Day to request an Absentee Ballot for Primary

May 14 - PRIMARY ELECTION DAY. Polls are open from 6: 30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. If you are in line at 7:30 p.m., you may still vote. If you appear at the polls at 7:31 p.m., you will not be permitted to vote.

Monongalia County voters will be voting on the renewal of four levies that must be approved by 60 percent of the voters to pass and a school bond issue that must be approved by 50 percent of the voters to pass. All of the levies have social justice implications as they would continue support for the Morgantown Public Library System, Mountain Line bus system, volunteer fire departments and Morgantown Fire Department, and parks, trails, and recreation (county parks, West Virginia Botanic Garden, rail trails, etc. The bond issue is for the proposed Renaissance Academy focused on STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) for the county high school students.

Monongalia County voters will also be electing members of the Board of Education, judges, and magistrates. These are the final elections for these positions, while voters will be choosing candidates for the November election for members of the state legislature, members of Congress, governor, etc. Residents of Star City and Westover will be voting for local officials and, for Westover, a proposed charter amendment.

Voters who are registered as Democrats, Republicans, Libertarians, or Mountain Party members MUST vote the ballot of that party. Voters who are registered with no party affiliation, may choose any of the above four ballots but must tell the poll workers their choice. If not, they will be given a ballot that only includes races and issues with no party affiliation: levies, bond issue, Board of Education, and judicial officers in Monongalia County. Everyone will have the same ballot in November.

May- National Foster Care Month: This month is a time to acknowledge the children and youth in foster care and their families and the foster parents and mentors who help them find a forever home. It's a great way to reflect on how you can help your community to better support those helping to improve their lives.

May 2- National Day of Prayer: This annual observance reminds the nation to come together to pray for its leaders and citizens for guidance through prayer. This was first established as a way for all Americans to express their faith, regardless of their religion. It's been celebrated since 1952.

May 4-Armed Forces Day: Today, we honor all five branches of the U.S. military. This annual holiday has united Americans to celebrate those who have served or are serving our country since 1949.

May 5-National Day for Awareness of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls: Commemorated in both the United States and Canada, this day serves as a reminder of an ongoing crisis of kidnapping and violence faced by Indigenous women and girls. Also known as Red Dress Day, it hopes to raise awareness among the general public about an alarming issue that is underreported in mass media.

May 6: om HaShoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day): This day is dedicated to remembering the six million Jews who died in the Holocaust as a result of the Nazi regime.

May 17-International Day Against Homophobia, Transphobia and Biphobia: Established to raise awareness of LGBTQ+ rights violations and stimulate interest in LGBTQ+ rights work worldwide. This day emphasizes the need for acceptance and equality for all, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity.

May 21-World Day for Cultural Diversity for Dialogue and Development: Recognized by the United Nations, this day celebrates the richness of the world's cultures and the essential role of intercultural dialogue for achieving peace and sustainable development.

May 23-Vesak: Also known as Buddha Day, Vesak commemorates the birth, enlightenment (Nirvana), and death (Parinirvana) of Gautama Buddha in the Theravada or southern tradition. It is the most significant day for Buddhists worldwide, observed with prayers, meditation, and acts of charity.

May 24-Pansexual and Panromantic Awareness Day: Honor those in your life who identify as panromantic and pansexual. Pan people are attracted to who a person is not how they identify. This day celebrates the community's ability to express their sexuality openly in a world that is accepting of all humans.

May 28-Trail of Tears: The Trail of Tears represents ethnic cleansing and forced relocations for many Native American nations after the Indian Removal Act was enacted in 1830. During this time, nearly 60,000 people were displaced until 1850. Members of Five Tribes, including Cherokee, Seminole, Muscogee, Choctaw, and Chickasaw, were removed from their homes and moved to a new Indian territory after the discovery of gold near their ancestral land.
