Native American Heritage Month – Celebrates and honors the history and culture of Native Americans in the United States.

November 2: International Day to End Impunity for Crimes against Journalists — A day to emphasize that information is essential for decision making whether it be economic, social or political. Information is the cornerstone for democracy, good government and effective institutions. During the past decade 700 journalists have been killed worldwide.

November 9: Day against Racism – A call for global action against intolerance and its attendant violence as well as enhancement of communal and national tolerance, fairness, and mutual respect.

November 13: World Kindness Day – Calls for special deliberate efforts to treat others with kindness and even to exceed the rights which people can expect or hope to be honored in their relationships with others.

November 16: International Day for Tolerance – Emphasizes the dangers of intolerance and is a call for action for the advancement of human welfare, freedom, and progress

everywhere, as well as a day to encourage tolerance, respect dialogue, and cooperation among different cultures and peoples.

November 20: Universal Children's Day – The world-wide day for promoting mutual exchange and understanding among children and for initiating action to benefit and promote the welfare of the world's children.

November 25: International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women – A day for emphasizing awareness that violence against women is a preventable human rights violation based on discrimination against women and a perception of inequalities between men and women.

November 27: Thanksgiving Day – Following a 19th Century tradition, this day commemorates the Pilgrim's harvest feast in the autumn of 1621 and their successful interdependence with Native Americans making the feast possible.

Voter turnout in West Virginia, sadly, is the definition of the above statement. According to Ballotpedia.org, only 55.5% of eligible voters turned out in the November 2024 general election compared to 64.1% nationally. Numbers in non-presidential elections in West Virginia were a dismal 35.4% in 2022.

There are almost 53,000 seats to be filled in November 2025 elections across the United States. While we do not have a November 2025 election in West Virginia, there are important races being decided across our borders in Pennsylvania and Virginia. If you are reading this newsletter across state borders, please participate in your elections and assist any community members may that have barriers to transportation get to the polls. If you have friends and family in states with elections next week, encourage them to make their voice heard at the ballot box. It is certainly NOT a mandate of a single party's agenda if voter participation can statistically prove otherwise.

The LWV-Morgantown/Monongalia is seeking a member to serve as board advisor and attend our meetings once per month to educate members on environmental issues. Environmental issues and protecting a sustainable future are League priorities and sadly our previous board member passed away last year. The League can then assist by promoting or opposing legislation and actions that the public should be aware of in real time with our Make Some Noise campaigns.
